	1. BSC Policing Network Sole Author Prize	2. BSC Policing Network Early Career Prize
Aim	To acknowledge and celebrate excellence in policing research and scholarship by members of the BSC and BSC Policing Network. In particular, the panel will look for the <i>advancement of policing studies</i> , either through innovations in theory, methodology or the application of research in a sole-authored journal article.	To acknowledge and celebrate excellence in policing research and scholarship by early career members of the BSC and BSC Policing Network (as defined in the eligibility criteria below). In particular, the panel will look for a <i>valuable contribution</i> to the field of policing studies through the publication of a sole-authored journal article.
Eligibility criteria	<p>Applicants:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - must be the sole author of a peer reviewed journal article; - can be at any stage of their career; - must be members of the BSC and the BSC Policing Network; - may nominate themselves, though others may nominate them with the applicant's permission; - if not the author, those who nominate an applicant must be members of the BSC. 	<p>Applicants:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - must be the sole author of a peer reviewed journal article; - must also be early career academics. This is defined as someone, who at the time of publication of the piece being considered for the early career prize, was: (i) within the first five years of his or her first appointment to a teaching or research position at a university or higher education institution OR (ii) a postgraduate student or someone within five years of completing their PhD. - must be members of the BSC and the BSC Policing Network; - may nominate themselves,
